Deadline for Nordic applicants coming up 15 April! Master of Visual Anthropology at UiT The Arctic University of Norway

We invite you to apply to one of only two international master programmes in visual anthropology in the Nordic countries. In Tromsø there is a focus on ethnographic film with all students having to complete a film as part of their master project. Here are some reasons why our programme may be of interest:

- The programme, like the rest of the university and city, is very international, thanks also to our long-term experience of exchange and cooperation with universities all over the world and Cameroon and Mali in particular. Unless the corona pandemic prevails we thus expect to have at least 5 students from Cameroon or Mali with us for the autumn term 2021.
- There are no tuition fees.

CFF: Riga Pasaules Film Festival 2021

The curating team of the Riga Pasaules Film Festival (RPFF) is calling for submissions that address cinema's relationship to the temporal experience. We are looking for works of a broad anthropological persuasion that, through their content and form, consider ways in which imaginaries and practices of time are rendered and generated through cinema. For example, we are interested in works that represent time-based events; that generate their own temporal

signatures; and offer a creative take on different temporal perspectives.

We are interested in films that represent and generate temporal imaginings. For example, we are interested in films whose plot addresses the tensions between continuity and change, ideas on the past and the future, and the politics of time. We also wish to review films that develop a perspective on cinematic-time and the experience of time as it is generated through the cinematic medium. Films that, for example, foreground duration, rhythm, and pace.

The 2021 RPFF edition will be the festival's 8th edition and it is scheduled to be held from the **3rd** - **6th June 2021** at Kino Bize in central Riga. The Call for Films will be open until the **31st January 2021** and the programme will be announced by the 1st April 2021.
